What a Cloud Migration Really Means

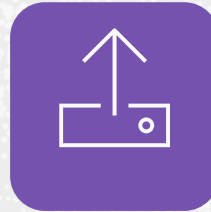
A cloud migration doesn't just move your existing environment into someone else's data center. It's a transformation that introduces new architecture, efficiencies, and visibility.

The Migration Journey: What to Expect

1 Discovery & Assessment

- Inventory existing sites, servers, integrations, and data
- Identify configuration discrepancies and local customizations
- Document which elements can be standardized and which require decisions

2 Planning & Design

- Define your enterprise structure and who manages what
- Establish governance roles for access, reporting, and data ownership
- Determine migration phases (pilot, batch, or all-in-one)

3 Data Preparation & Migration

- Cleanse and normalize existing data
- Choose what historical data to migrate or archive
- Validate migrated data through test imports

4 Configuration & Testing

- Apply standardized enterprise settings
- Test workflows and integrations across locations
- Involve both IT and operations stakeholders in testing

5 Training & Change Management

- Train administrators and end users on new processes
- Communicate benefits clearly and often
- Assign “change champions” at key sites

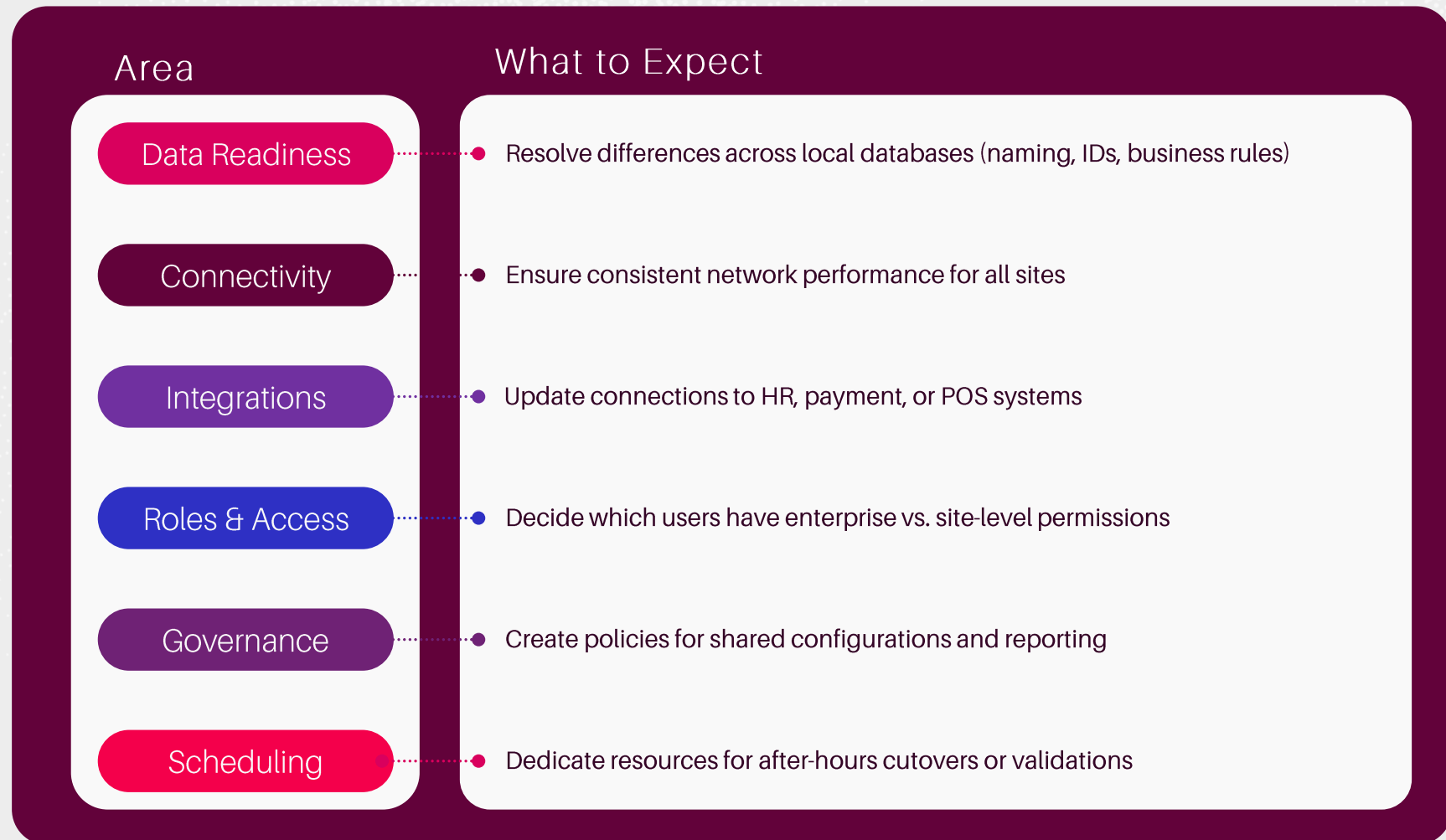
6 Go-Live & Optimization

- Coordinate cutover and validation with vendor or cloud team
- Monitor performance and user experience
- Optimize and document lessons learned for future phases

Common Readiness Tasks and Decisions

A successful migration depends on collaboration between your internal teams and your vendor's services or cloud teams.

Key readiness areas and tasks include:



Best Practices for a Smooth Transition

Start early with a readiness assessment.

Resolve differences across local databases (naming, IDs, business rules)

Engage stakeholders early.

Include IT, operations, and decision-makers in design and governance discussions.

Communicate consistently.

Regular updates minimize confusion and build confidence.

Pilot before scaling.

Begin with a few sites to identify lessons and standardize processes.

Dedicate change champions.

Empower on-site contacts to guide users through the new system processes.

Document and celebrate wins.

Keep a living record of configurations, data rules, and lessons learned. Note what worked well, and share success stories internally.
